I hope this letter finds you well. We seem to have turned a corner in Ghana and although regional COVID-19 guidelines remain, there has been a loosening of National Government rules. The vaccination program is underway, but due to a lack of availability and a reluctant general public, only 4% of Ghanaians have been vaccinated, slowing the nations plans to return to something as close to normality as is possible.

To accelerate and assist in the vaccination program, Germany is tackling the pandemic alongside Ghana and has created G-WAC (German – West African Centre for Global Health and Pandemic Prevention). Not only will this allow interdisciplinary research and development, the partnership will look at the resilience of health systems and ways to continuously improve as a nation. This will create an infrastructure solid enough to support the nation, leading to stability and the avoidance of disruption due to pandemics long term. **German-West African Research Centre at KNUST:  
 Tackling global pandemics through cooperation**

TO address the existential threat of global pandemics, a German-West African Centre for Global Health and Pandemic Prevention (G-WAC) will be established at the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology (KNUST).

G-WAC will be one of four centres globally and will work with the Technical University of Berlin and other German and international institutions through interdisciplinary research projects. G-WAC

will target both the main drivers of pandemics and the resilience of health systems.

It will facilitate international academic exchange through collaborative research and offer study and research opportunities for local and international students and scientists. Further, it will bring on board stakeholders from outside the academic sphere to transfer research findings into practical applications.

We continue to operate in adherence to local guidelines to safeguard the health and safety of our team and the general public. Although this is the case, we can say that aside from the Christmas and New Year breaks, it is looking very positive for us to be in production imminently.

At present we continue our imperative regeneration work, ensuring we are rewarding farmers with rich fertile land replanted with seedlings from our on-site nursery. In addition, we have been able to stockpile large amounts of ore ready for processing once we bring the full team on site.

This new and very positive outlook now gives us light at the end of a very long tunnel and we look forward to resuming operation in the very near future.
